

January 10: HEERF II and III Student Grant Report

(1) An acknowledgement that the institution signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used the applicable amount of funds designated under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

HNU signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement.

(2) The total amount of funds that the institution will receive or has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs.

Our total HEERF II or CRRSAA allocation was \$1,475,062 = \$447,724 (student aid minimum) + \$1,027,338 (institutional aid). HNU also received \$99,355 for being a Minority Serving Institution for a total of \$1,574,417 in CRRSAA support.

As for ARP, the allocation for Emergency Grants to Students was \$1,295,892.

(3) The total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs as of the date of submission (i.e., as of the initial report and every calendar quarter thereafter).

As of 12/30/2021, we distributed \$1,743,616 in Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students using CRRSAA and ARP funds.

(4) The estimated total number of students at the institution that are eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs.

(6) The method(s) used by the institution to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs.

The criteria for student selection were based on enrollment - all enrolled students were eligible and included. For the amount given to each student, there was a formula followed based on FAFSA provided Expected Family Contribution (EFC) in a 3-tiered structure ranging from \$200/student (if they had no FAFSA or their EFC was on the higher end of the scale), approximately \$500 for midrange and up to \$750/student for those who were PELL eligible with low EFC.

(7) Any instructions, directions, or guidance provided by the institution to students concerning the Emergency Financial Aid Grants.

Unlike HEERF 1, no instructions or guidance was provided.
